He estimates 30-50 speakers in the Murray-Upper Kennedy region, at least two dozen of whom are fluency some children are still learning it as a first language. Sutton contacted speakers at Mt. Garnet, Minnamoolka Station, Hot Springs and Palm Island in 1970 when he recorded songs and some Djalnguy.
