 (AC); probably *Anda?aneti* (Sharp)

Though separated from *Awngthim* by *Linngitig* and
Aritinngitig, Hale says is more closely related to it
 than to them. There are 2 myths by McConnel in
 'Oceania (1:4)

113.4f* Djonggandji ? *** Batavia River Y42 (AIAS Y14)
 (5Yr.) (McC)

Djonggandji (AC, AIAS, 'RLS' 5Yr., Lippmann),

Tjungantji (SIL), *Tyongandji* (McC), *Tjungundji* (Thomson), *Chongunji* (R), *Tjongkandji* (T)

Originally spoken at Mapoon. SIL recorded 150 words in 1964. There were then 4 speakers at Mapoon and possibly 4 others elsewhere. Thomson referred to them as the northern neighbours of the *Nggerigudi*.

(15Yr.) Bay, near Weipa ('RLS');
Pine River north of Weipa (SIL)

SIL 150 word list recorded in 1964 reveals it is very closely related to *Djonggandji*. In 1964 there were 12 speakers at Weipa, 6 at Bamaga and some elsewhere.

113.5a* Linngithig ** South-west of Embley Y79 (AIAS Y26)
(105.4d) River & west side of
(16Yr.) Hey River (KH); south
side of Albatross Bay (SIL)

From *Iin* 'this' (KH)

Linngithig (KH, SAW), *Lenngidigh* (AC, AIAS), *Len(i)-ngiti* (alt. 'LS'), *Liningiti* (BS), probably *Ladamngid* (AIAS Y30, 'RLS' 16Yr.)

In 1960 when Hale collected his data there were c. 6 speakers at Aurukun and Weipa. Hale's 20 page grammar is still the major reference for northern Paman. McConnell has a little on kinship and Capell a little on tape.
