Kilham says Wik Ngandjara is used as a cover term for several Gugu - languages (Mumenh, Mu?in, Ugbanh and Uwanh)

114.2* Wik Muminh ** Coastal area south Y91 (AIAS Y43) of mouth of Holroyd River (BS map)

Wik Muminh (O'G, 'RLS', BAS, KL, 'AL'), Mumanh (BS, CK)

Hale distinguishes 2 orders of stops and one of nasals at 5 linear points of articulation, glottal, 1, r, w, R, y and 3 vowels. Kilham says c. 30 speakers remain at Aurukun and Edward River.

Wik Me?an (KH, BS), Wik Me?nh (BAS), Wikmei'an (McC), Wik Me?nha ('AL') Mejan (AC, orig. AIAS), Wikmean (alt. 'LS', O'G, 'RLS'), Wik Me'ana ('LS')

McConnel says they are distinguished by the Wik Munggan people as those who speak Me'anbaka. Hale distinguishes only one order of stops (+glottal) but 6 vowels and length on 4 of them. There are only about a dozen speakers at Aurukun.
